






Dr. Mohammad Nasr Dadras, GP, MD, MPH

Dr. Mohammad Nasr Dadras, GP, MD, MPH, is the Head of the Surveillance Department at the Iranian Center for Communicable Diseases Control (CDC) and Ministry of Health and Medical Education (MOHME) in Iran. He has been in his current position as Head of the Surveillance Department at the Iranian CDC for more than 12 years. Prior to joining the Iranian CDC, Dr. Dadras served as the director of the communicable diseases program unit at a district health center and its superordinate provincial health headquarters. He then served as the deputy director of the Department of Vaccine-Preventable Diseases at the Iranian CDC for seven years, followed by seven years as the deputy director of the Surveillance Department. Dr. Dadras his medical degree from Tehran in 1993 and has since dedicated his career to the health sector, starting at the rural level and moving up to district and provincial health centers.

Dr. Dadras' extensive experience in communicable disease control spans over two decades, during which he played a key role in the Measles Elimination National Program and the Influenza Surveillance Program at the national level. He has been responsible for planning, implementing, monitoring, and evaluating strategic and operational plans related to seasonal and pandemic influenza at the Iranian CDC. Dr. Dadras' expertise in communicable disease control has been instrumental in shaping public health policies and strategies in Iran. He also holds a Master of Public Health degree.
